An Audit of Community Facilities in Dunblane 2010

Introduction

This report has been compiled by Stirling Council and Dunblane Development Trust for two reasons:-

1. It is valuable for the Council and local community bodies in Dunblane to be aware of the role that existing community facilities fulfil and to be able to identify any gaps in provision or any under utilisation of resources. A Community Facilities Working Group has been set up by DDT to enable those that run local halls to share knowledge & experience and to plan for the future.
2. Dunblane Development Trust is considering taking the Braeport Centre into community ownership and Stirling Council's procedures require a survey of this type to be carried out in order to provide evidence of a continuing need for the Centre



The Audit was undertaken by means of a questionnaire sent out in late 2010 to known community facilities in the Town. It is only a snapshot - things change quickly and we have probably missed some facilities out. Thanks are due to all those who completed the questionnaires and made this audit possible.

Main Findings of the Community Facilities Audit

1. Dunblane is clearly a very active community!
2. There is little spare capacity in large halls on weekday evenings, for example the Dunblane Centre is fully booked and Dunblane High has many football-related sessions.
3. There is spare capacity in the evenings in all the schools particularly Dunblane High
4. There appears to be some spare capacity during the day, particularly in those venues that have smaller halls & meeting rooms.
5. Although Victoria Halls, the Cathedral Halls and some of the churches do have classes and programmes for older people, from the information provided none of the halls or community spaces appear to predominately have this user profile.
6. The QV School appears to be more available for community use than had been thought
7. The loss of the community facilities at Scottish Churches House that will result from its closure in June is regrettable and it will have an impact on other facilities in the town.
8. With the cuts in public expenditure, the future viability of the Council owned-community facilities (the Braeport Centre and the Victoria Hall) will need to be closely monitored.
